

IRPCV NEWS Meet Idaho's New Peace Corps Recruiter!

Amber Gomes started working with the Seattle Peace Corps recruitment office in January 2015 as a Regional Recruiter specifically for Idaho and a few Washington State schools.

Amber received a bachelor's in International Studies and one in Political Science, as well as minoring in Spanish and Psychology at Oregon State University. Immediately after her graduation in June 2012 she left for her Peace Corps Service in Kenya where she served until July 2014.

As a Peace Corps volunteer, Amber worked in the Public Health Sector with Kalawa Health Centre in Kenya. Though she was attached to the Health Centre, where she was able to help with Voluntary Testing and Counseling services for HIV/AIDS and in training Kalawa's first Community Health Workers, a majority of her work took place in the wider community. Utilizing the tradition of International Scouts in Kenya she was able to revitalize the Scouts Clubs in 7 primary schools in the region to teach Reproductive Health, Agriculture, and a variety of Life Skills topics, as well as hosting an overnight Scouts Camp, and day camps for girls. She was even able to take some of her Scouts to national camps hosted by PEPFAR (President's Fund for Emergency AIDS Relief) which were some of her favorite activities! She also worked with multiple local Community-Based Organizations like Maka (Makinya/Kalawa) and Kyeni Kya Mboo (Light of the Village) to install rain tanks, create an education center and start a goat husbandry project. Her largest project was in conjunction with NGOs World Connect and Books for Africa through which she was able to ship 40,000 books to Kalawa District and coordinate the establishment of libraries with 40 local schools.

For Amber her Peace Corps experience was the fulfillment of a personal goal she had held since she first read about the Peace Corps in a National Geographic

> article when she was 12. More so though, it was an experience that was challenging yet thrilling and rewarding in ways she never could have expected. She says that though she had "studied abroad and traveled before, and had great experiences, there's nothing that can compare to living and working in a different culture and really having the opportunity to make those personal and professional connections with people of another culture".

PEACE CORPS NEWS Victory! Equity Act Language Approved

A deeply divided Congress struggled - but last week passed - an appropriations bill to fund most of the government for the remaining nine months of Fiscal Year 2015. With that passage and with last night's signature by President Obama - came approval of language that will implement the Peace Corps Equity Act.

This language will bring fairness to female Peace Corps Volunteers

who face the difficult decision when considering pregnancy termination in the rare circumstances of rape, incest or life endangerment.

For the thousands of members of the Peace Corps community who raised their voice for equitable treatment of our volunteers, actions have led to this important policy change.



Idaho Among Peace Corps' Top Volunteer-Producing States in 2014

State Climbs the Rankings for the Third Consecutive Year

WASHINGTON, December 16, 2014

The Peace Corps today released the 2014 rankings of the top volunteer-producing states and metropolitan areas across the country. Idaho ranked No. 6 among states with the highest number of Peace Corps volunteers per capita, with 4.2 volunteers currently serving worldwide for every 100,000 residents.

"Peace Corps volunteers promote a better understanding of Americans around the world by sharing their unique hometown perspective during their service," Peace Corps Director Carrie Hessler-Radelet said. "As we forge a modern Peace Corps for modern times, we remain committed to building a volunteer force that reflects the rich diversity of our country, and doing more to recruit and retain the best and brightest across the country."

Since the Peace Corps was established in 1961, 1,328 Peace Corps volunteers from Idaho have traveled abroad to serve their country in the cause of peace by living and working in developing countries. The state produced 67 volunteers this year and jumped up one spot on the per capita list from No. 7 in 2013 and three spots from its No. 10 spot in 2012.

"We applaud the volunteers from Idaho who have become global citizens by sharing their talents overseas and building friendships that will last a lifetime," said Erin Carlson, acting manager of the Peace Corps West Coast Region. "This is the third consecutive year the state has ranked among the top ten per capita producers of Peace Corps volunteers." The Peace Corps has eight regional recruitment offices across the United States that work closely with prospective Peace Corps volunteers of all ages and backgrounds to ensure that all Americans who want to serve have the opportunity to do so.

The West Coast regional recruitment office serves Alaska, California, Hawaii, Idaho, Montana, Nevada, Oregon, Washington and Peace Corps recruiters are based locally throughout the region. Find the regional recruitment office near you by visiting the Peace Corps website.

PEACE CORPS NEWS Peace Corps Azerbaijan Volunteers Safely Close Their Service, Program Suspended

WASHINGTON, D.C., Dec. 30, 2014

The Peace Corps today announced that all Peace Corps Azerbaijan volunteers have safely and successfully closed their service and departed the country. The program is being suspended following 11 years of partnership and support from the Government of Azerbaijan.

The Peace Corps values its relationship with the people of

Azerbaijan and hopes to work with them again at some point in the future.

Since the program was established in 2003, 550 Peace Corps volunteers have served in Azerbaijan working on projects in youth development, community economic development and English education.



The Peace Corps Announces Record-Breaking Application Numbers in 2014

Applications reach 22-year high for the agency

WASHINGTON, D.C., Oct. 8, 2014

Today the Peace Corps announced that 17,336 Americans applied for two-year service positions in fiscal year 2014 - a 22-year high for the agency and an increase in applications of more than 70 percent over last year. In 1992, the Peace Corps received 17,438 applications, with the next highest number of applications received in 1979 at 18,159. Today's announcement follows historic changes to Peace Corps' application and selection process that have made applying to the Peace Corps simpler, faster, and more personalized than ever before. "This milestone reminds us that Americans today want to serve others and make a difference, and we are making great strides to reduce barriers to service and modernize the Peace Corps," Director Carrie Hessler-Radelet said. "There is great demand for

Peace Corps volunteers around the world, and our reforms have better positioned us to offer assignments where volunteers have the most interest in serving and are able to make the greatest contribution." In July 2014 when these changes were launched, the agency saw an increase in applications of more than 400 percent over July 2013 and the highest total number of applications received in one month in more than 15 years. Applicants can now choose their country of service and apply to specific programs through a new, shorter application that can be completed in less than one hour. The recruitment reforms cut red tape, increase transparency and reduce uncertainty to deliver a better experience for Peace Corps applicants so they can choose the path that best fits their personal and professional goals. Since the reforms were implemented, 54 percent of all applicants have selected the option to serve anywhere they're needed, and 49 percent have selected the option

to serve in any of Peace Corps' six work sectors.

The agency is revitalizing its recruitment and outreach and modernizing its operations after losing a number of qualified candidates because of a burdensome application process. In 2013, only 23 percent of those who started the application submitted it. Now, approximately 95 percent of those who start the application are submitting it. Hessler-Radelet, who was sworn in as the agency's 19th director in June and comes from a fourgeneration Peace Corps family, has led one of the most extensive reform efforts the agency has ever undertaken. In addition to recruitment reforms, the Peace Corps has dramatically improved the quality of support it provides to volunteers, overhauled its technical training and programming, and strategically targeted its resources and country presence to maximize impact.
