
Matt Anders, our current IRPCV Web Editor, received an online request from the grandson of Ranjit Menon in May regarding IRPCV Kent Kay. Kent Kay is from Idaho, and he was hosted by Ranjit's grandparents during his time as an RPCV in India in the 60s. In his request, the grandson included the last communication of Kent to his host family. Following this request, John Hammond and Arnold Burgemeister, both of whom served in India around the same time as Kent, researched information about Kent and his family while contacting George Nepert of Friends of India to find a way to e-mail Ranjit. They were able to get in touch with him, while Arnold describes how this situation displays the "degrees of separation" which within RPCVs is very narrow. Ranjit ended up responding with the message below with pictures:

"Hi George, Connie, Matt, Tom, John and Arnie and anyone I may have missed! Thank you all so much for your help! My mother Pravina will really appreciate this. It's quite amazing how quickly you were able to locate Kent. It was great to hear about the poultry farming program in the 60s. Incidentally my mother (see picture) and her family moved to Mysore in the 80s and that's where I spent my childhood and college days before moving to the US; it was cool to know that the same program ran in Mysore. There were probably many shared experiences between the volunteers then, some of which I heard through stories told by my mother. It inspires me to become a volunteer myself for the Peace Corps someday. Thank you all again! Hope you all have a fantastic day!"

In Memoriam: Lorissa Wilfong-Holt (1934-2017)

Idaho Returned Peace Corps Volunteer, Lorissa Wilfong-Holt, passed away this year on January 16, 2017, in Emmett, Idaho. Born in Kiev, Unkraine, Lorissa and her mother were taken by the Nazis following the invasion of Kiev. They interned as slaves to work in officers' kitchens in various concentration camps, the last one being at Dachau. It was in Dachau where they were liberated by the Allies. After fives years as displaced persons, Lorissa, her mother and her brother were assigned to Emmett, Idaho in 1950. Lorissa loved Emmett, Idaho and America. After the death of her husband, John Wilfong, she decided at the age of 60 to give back to her country and joined the Peace Corps. She completed her service in Hungary from 1994-1996. After returning to Emmett post-service, Lorissa remarried and continued her life while delivering lectures on her life experiences as a survivor and Peace Corps Volunteer. She wrote two books about both of these pivotal events titled: "I Remember: A Memoir of Nazi Invasion, Forced Exile and Concentration Camp," and "A Gift of Life," which detailed her Peace Corps experiences. Both of these books are available on Amazon. Lorissa spoke at the Peace Corps 50th celebration at the Boise Historical Museum. Her humor and love of life made us all glad that she was part of us. Peace Lorissa.

In her new book "DAD #1, DAD#2," IRPCV Natalie Perry shares her powerful family story. Natalie's dad is a former Chief Judge of the Idaho State Court of Appeals. He would have lost his job if he'd come out publicly. So, for twenty years Natalie lived in a closeted gay family. Dad #1. Dad #2 is the first memoir written by a child growing up in a closeted LGBTQ family and chronicles the highs and lows of growing up with gay dads in one of the most conservative states in the country. While Natalie's family kept their secret for two decades, they have now all agreed to share their story. 
