Join fellow volunteers in a volunteer activity at the Idaho Food Bank. Food Bank staff will meet you there and show you the tasks that are needed. In the past we have bagged bulk lentils for individual distribution and worked with frozen bread products. It could be chilly so bring a jacket or sweater and gloves.

About The Idaho Foodbank (IFB)
The Idaho Foodbank is an independent nonprofit organization that has worked with a network of partner agencies to distribute free emergency food to individuals and families in need for more than 25 years. More than a statewide distribution system, this network of more than 200 partner agencies consists of emergency food pantries, community kitchens, shelters and programs that collectively work together to relieve hunger in Idaho.

IFB provides programs that serve an important role in communities that lack resources for hungry families and children. These programs include:

- Backpack Program: supplies weekend nutrition to school children who would otherwise go hungry over the weekend.
- Mobile Pantry Program: provides emergency food to rural areas and areas lacking emergency food services.
- Grocery Alliance Program: partners with grocery stores and supermarkets to provide fresh nutritious food.
- Picnic in the Park: The Picnic in the Park Program provides nutrition for food-insecure children during the summer months, when the school lunch they depended on is unavailable.
- Idaho Community Gardens Program: coordinates food distribution between local community gardens and emergency food pantries throughout the state.
- Beef Counts: an innovative program established and endorsed by the Idaho Cattle Association, The Idaho Cattlewomen Council, Agri Beef Co., and the Idaho Beef Council to provide fresh beef into the Foodbank

Individual donations, grants and corporate donations are the primary sources of funding for The Idaho Foodbank. The organization does not depend on government funding or subsidies. Food donations are accepted from manufacturers, wholesalers and retailers, community and corporate food drives and through the national Feeding America network. Tax-deductible cash donations are critical to underwrite the costs associated with acquiring, transporting, warehousing and distributing food throughout the state of Idaho.



### **Returned Volunteer Activities and News**

Louise Davison practicing the Third Goal:

You just never know. It's never too late. At 65 I went into the Peace Corps. And now, nearing 70, I've found the best job I've ever had—right here on the Palouse. Within ten miles of my home, I've traveled to twenty-five countries and counting.

After returning from Peace Corps, Neill Public Library's Director approached me to teach English as a Second Language [ESL] at the library. I had recently certified to teach ESL (with the intention of going back overseas), so I agreed not to teach per se but to hold ESL conversations. The library sent out the word and the rest is currently an unfolding adventure that is as good as traveling around the world. Moscow's library called a bit later and asked if I knew anyone who would do the same in Moscow. Long story short, I now meet in both libraries twice weekly, and only skip these magic sessions when I have to!

Pullman's group once had twelve countries represented one night, which might sound unmanageable—until you meet these intelligent, humorous, adventurous people. Our discussions have ranged from military service to care for the disabled, inheritance customs, weddings, and funerals. We have riotously covered body parts. favorite vacations, and the lives our grandparents lived. We've had phenomenal parties and picnics with spectacular food. We always laugh. Because of mutual trust, there is incredible openness and true friendships have formed. And tears upon departures. Moscow's group—a steady six or seven women this past year—from Egypt China, and Turkey—has covered everything from sex education to the prejudice these lovely professional women have endured on KLM airlines and at the Palouse Empire Mall. So many visiting scholars and graduate students come to our towns now; they go off each day to conduct their research or study with colleagues in a language-rich environment. Most come with spouses and families, and it is the spouses who are more or less left out. (I know because I "lived" this in 1970 in Norway and suffered the blackest depression of my life.) The official university language programs are terrific, but expensive, and young children often prevent this and other options anyway. The conversation groups provide a unique social and learning opportunity: sure, we "do" vocabulary and work on pronunciationcontinuously—but what's really happening is that we are all learning the reasons behind, and the differences between, our cultures. And, ah, those smiles of recognition that light up the room when we discover our similarities.

"Travel is fatal to prejudice, bigotry, and narrow-mindedness . . . . Broad, wholesome, charitable views of men and things cannot be acquired by vegetating in one little corner of the earth all one's lifetime" [Mark Twain]. Stop vegetating. Travel the world without spending a dime. Create an ESL group of your own. There are more than enough visitors to go around.

The most fun job I've ever had. And I've learned so much. So very much.

### Service and Commitment Beyond Graduation: U-Idaho Ranks 7th in Peace Corps Rankings

MOSCOW, Idaho – The University of Idaho has a long-standing tradition of opening doors for students to the world, and this year, that effort is being recognized as the university ranks seventh on the Peace Corps' 2013 Top Colleges amongst medium-sizes schools.

"We are proud of taking our tradition of service learning and the spirit of helping others worldwide," said University of Idaho President M. Duane Nellis. "We are pleased to see the great work our students do while at the university and as alumni."

Currently, there are 33 undergraduate alumni serving in the Peace Corps; historically 521 Vandals have served overseas in the program. Graduating senior Alex Rheault, of Fargo, N.D., hopes to join the swelling ranks. She has been nominated to the national office and is waiting for an assignment for environmental education.

"I've volunteered all my life," said Rheault, an environmental science major with a Spanish minor. "I want to help people, bring ideas to another country to help them live in a more sustainable way. I really look forward to learning a lot from them as well."

On a high school mission trip to Peru, Rheault saw firsthand the living conditions in a developing nation. The trip reinforced her desire to give her time, skills and resources to help other people, but not necessarily "save" them.

University programs like the Alternative Service Break, Paint the Palouse and Saturday of Service helped Rheault solidify her desire to serve in the Peace Corps and help others while gaining invaluable experience. Currently, she serves as the volunteer coordinator at the Sustainability Center.

"It's really getting me excited to go, especially when I see the joy when people volunteer," said Rheault.

Rheault has several new experiences to look forward to. Marya Nowakowski, Peace Corps regional representative in Spokane, said that beyond learning a new language and culture and broadening their worldview, Peace Corps members receive technical training and leadership skills that will help them secure employment after their two-year term is up.

"One of the characteristics of students we meet at the University of Idaho is they have really good work experience and volunteer experience from home and on campus," said Nowakowski, who was recently on the University of Idaho campus for its job fair. "There is real advocacy for hands-on experience and education."

Currently, more than 8,000 volunteers are working with communities in 76 host countries on projects related to agriculture, community economic development, education, environment, health and youth development.

The annual list recognizes the highest volunteer-producing colleges and universities for small, medium, large and graduate institutions. While the University of Idaho ranked seventh for medium-sized colleges, 5,000–15,000 undergraduates, the university is in the top 10 with universities such as Western Washington University, American University, The George Washington University, Cornell University and Georgetown University.

"Every year, graduates of colleges and universities across the United States are making a difference in communities overseas through Peace Corps service," said Carrie Hessler-Radelet, acting director for the Peace Corps. "As a result of the top-notch education they receive, these graduates are well prepared for the challenge of international service. They become leaders in their host communities and carry the spirit of service and leadership back with them when they return home."

The University of Idaho is one of 23 universities from the West Coast producing globally-minded leaders who turn idealism into action as Peace Corps volunteers, according to Janet Allen, regional manager for the Peace Corps West Coast.

"Peace Corps announces 'Top Colleges' annually to recognize the schools that contribute the most alumni who are making a difference overseas through volunteer service," said Allen. "Personally, I'm thrilled to see the University of Idaho in the top 10 for the first time."

During Peace Corps service, college graduates make a difference in communities overseas. Volunteers return home as global citizens with cross-cultural, leadership, language, teaching and community development skills that position them for advanced education and professional opportunities in today's global job market.


